




TOWER BUILDING, TERRACE LEVEL (LOWER LEVEL 1)




The Education Commission of the States (ECS) each year memorializes co-founder James Bryant Conant by honoring an individual for outstanding contributions to American education. This year, ECS is proud to recognize a leader for his work in developing and spreading the idea of a "chartered" sector in public education. The 2011 recipient of the ECS James Bryant Conant Award is Ted Kolderie, co-founder of Education|Evolving.

The Conant Award was established in 1997 by the ECS Steering Committee in honor of James Bryant Conant, who was a great educator, scientist and statesman. ECS presents it only to those individuals whose efforts and service have created a pronounced and lasting influence on American education. Previous award winners include Ron Wolk, Claiborne Pell, Theodore Sizer and Marian Wright Edelman, along with former Governors Gaston Caperton, Roy Romer, James Hunt Jr. and Richard Riley. ECS is proud to add Ted Kolderie to this esteemed list.

Kolderie is recognized nationally for his work on K-12 education policy and innovation since the early 1980s. In 1982, he was a member of Minnesota Governor Albert Quie's task force on education policy and a member of Governor Rudy Perpich's "Discussion Group" from 1985 to 1989.

He worked with the committee of the Citizens League that in late 1988 proposed "Chartered Schools," then with legislators and Minnesota Commissioner of Education Tom Nelson on the design and implementation of the country's first charter school law in 1991. A short paper he wrote in 1990, *The States Will Have To Withdraw the Exclusive*, though not the first publication about chartering, is regarded by many as the founding document of the contemporary charter movement. Through the early 1990s he worked with legislators and citizens on the design and improvement of charter legislation in more than 25 states, including California, Colorado, Michigan, Pennsylvania, Florida, New Jersey and Ohio. In 2005, he published Creating the Capacity for Change: How and Why Governors and Legislatures are Opening a New-Schools Sector in Public Education to share what he had learned working with elected officials and education leaders on education reform in the previous 15 years. In 2004, he and Joe Graba co-founded

Education|Evolving to be a nonpartisan policy group working in Minnesota and nationally on a strategy for change and improvement in K-12 education.

He has written for a variety of publications and has talked about the need for innovation in learning with organizations such as the National Education Association, the National School Boards Association, the American Federation of Teachers, the National Business Roundtable, the National Education Goals Panel, the National Conference of State Legislatures and the Progressive Policy Institute.

Before entering education policy, Kolderie worked on urban and metropolitan affairs and on questions of system design in the public sector. He started his career as a reporter and editorial writer with the Minneapolis Star and Tribune. He was executive director of the Citizens League in the Twin Cities area and in the 1980s was a senior fellow at the University of Minnesota's Hubert H. Humphrey Institute of Public Affairs. Kolderie graduated with a B.A. from Carleton College and a Master of Public Affairs degree from the Woodrow Wilson School of Public Affairs at Princeton University.

For Outstanding Contributions to American Education

Frank Newman Award for State Innovation

This year, the Education Commission of the States honors the New England Secondary School Consortium as the recipient of the 2011 Frank Newman Award for State Innovation. The annual award recognizes the Consortium's bold example of collaboration, expertise exchange and resource sharing across states, as well as its commitment to prioritizing 21st century skills, reducing persistent achievement gaps, improving the quality of secondary education and graduating every student prepared for life.

The Education Commission of the States has long recognized states and territories for innovation and excellence in education policy. In 2005, ECS named its State Innovation Award in honor of the late Frank Newman, who served as ECS president for 14 years. The Frank Newman Award recognizes education improvement efforts that are replicable and hold valuable lessons for other states; policies that are bold and courageous, including new policies designed for large-scale impact; and policies or programs that have bipartisan, broad-based support.

The New England Secondary School Consortium is a regional partnership that encompasses Connecticut, Maine, New Hampshire, Rhode Island and Vermont (*www.newenglandssc.org*). Since 2007, the partner states have developed a bold vision and shared goals designed to ensure that all public secondary students in the five member states receive an education that prepares them for success in the colleges, careers and communities of the 21st century. The states have committed to achieving the following objectives by 2016:

- Increase four-year, on-time graduation rates in each of the states to 90% or higher
- Decrease annual dropout rates to less than 1%
- Increase the percentage of students enrolling in twoand four-year college-degree programs, or pursuing accredited postsecondary credentials, to 80% or higher
- Reduce the number of students required to take remedial courses during their first year of college to 5% or less
- Forge a new partnership with higher education to dramatically increase college enrollment, persistence and degree-attainment rates.

With long-term sustainability in mind, the Consortium has spent the past three years establishing a broad-based leadership council composed of state education leaders and policymakers, developing an ambitious regional policy



agenda, refining common metrics for student attainment, and launching a variety of initiatives, including an educatordriven multistate support network, an annual conference for secondary educators, and a briefing series for state and school leaders. While each state has retained its individuality and continues to pursue its own customized secondary reform strategy, all five states are committed to pursuing common goals, sharing successes and setbacks, and working together regardless of leadership turnover, budget constraints or shifting political priorities.

The Consortium offers many lessons for other states looking to collaborate. Its flexible approach empowers the member states to achieve their own goals more effectively, while leveraging state, federal and foundation funding to increase coherence, alignment and momentum for secondary reforms with the potential to improve educational quality and outcomes for roughly 375,000 secondary students. The Consortium utilizes a "schoolhouse to statehouse" approach by working not only with state leaders, but also with districts, schools and educators. Finally, the Consortium develops research-based resources, such as its High Leverage Policy Framework and Global Best Practices self-assessment tool – to equip both policymakers and educators with practical, proven strategies as they undertake the complex work of education reform.

With coordination from the Great Schools Partnership (greatschoolspartnership.org), the New England Secondary School Consortium represents an efficient, high-impact, low-cost model for multistate collaboration that can achieve both local and state-level reforms at scale. ECS recognizes the chief state school officers and many other education leaders and educators in each of the five states who worked together to develop the Consortium. Their work honors the spirit of the late Frank Newman, and ECS is proud to recognize the five Consortium states with this award.

ExonMobil

The Education Commission of the States is pleased to recognize ExxonMobil as the 2011 recipient of the ECS Corporate Award. The tribute honors nonprofit organizations and for-profit corporations that have demonstrated a sustained commitment to, and investment in, improving public education, particularly efforts that reach those currently not well-served by the education system. The award was created under the leadership of former Wyoming Governor Jim Geringer, 1999-2000 ECS Chair.

At a time when not enough students are interested in and prepared for careers in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM), ExxonMobil's involvement in designing, developing and funding national and grassroots efforts to close this gap is commendable. The company is involved in a wide range of activities, from supporting programs that encourage youth to take an active interest in STEM careers, to facilitating the professional development of highly qualified teachers, to promoting the involvement of women and minorities in STEM studies and careers.

ExxonMobil is a founding sponsor of the National Math and Science Initiative (NMSI), launched in 2007 to prepare more students to succeed in STEM and prepare teachers to teach STEM effectively. The Initiative replicates programs that have shown quantifiable improvements, such as the Advanced Placement Training and Incentive Program (APTIP) and UTeach. The NMSI programs have produced impressive results in a short period of time. High schools participating in the APTIP for two years have produced a 97% increase in the number of passing scores on AP math, science and English exams. Furthermore, the achievement gap narrowed as African American and Hispanic students showed a 155% increase in exams passed. UTeach has been successfully implemented at 22 universities across the country, and enrollment has tripled. This program will produce a new generation of highly trained math and science teachers.

In 2005, ExxonMobil joined forces with golfer Phil Mickelson and his wife, Amy, to develop the Mickelson ExxonMobil Teachers Academy. Each summer, 600 3rdthrough 5th-grade teachers from around the country attend this free, five-day program that equips them with the skills to motivate students to pursue STEM careers. To date, more than 2,600 teachers have been trained.

Middle school students are the focus of the ExxonMobil Bernard Harris Summer Science Camp. Each year 1,250 underrepresented students attend one of 25 two-week camps held at college campuses around the country. The namesake of the program, Dr. Harris, was the first African American to walk in space. ExxonMobil is a major supporter of a number of organizations working to encourage minority students and women to study and pursue careers in STEM, including National Action Council for Minorities in Engineering, Society of Women Engineers and Society for Hispanic Professional Engineers.

ExxonMobil employees are also involved in the company's efforts. One example is the Science Ambassador Program, where more than 600 employees and retirees go into schools to serve as tutors, mentors and guest teachers. The company provides the volunteers with educational kits and a curriculum designed in collaboration with Scholastic. Finally, ExxonMobil has joined with over 100 CEOs and companies to form Change the Equation, an initiative launched in 2010 in response to President Obama's Educate to Innovate campaign.

ExxonMobil has taken a multi-faceted approach to tackling the problem that too few students are interested in or prepared for STEM careers. ECS applauds the commitment ExxonMobil has shown to improving American education and global competitiveness and is proud to honor them with the 2011 ECS Corporate Award.

Mike Griffith

Mike Griffith serves as the Senior K-12 and Higher Education School Finance Analyst for the Education Commission of the States (ECS). He has worked in the field of education finance policy for the past 14 years with ECS, the consulting firm of Augenblick & Myers ,and

the Michigan State Senate. Griffith is an expert resource to national news media and has been quoted more than 200 times by such outlets as: CNN, Education Week, The London Times, NBC Nightly News, National Public Radio, The New York Times, The News Hour with Jim Lehrer and USA Today. Frederick M. Hess

Frederick M. Hess is resident scholar and director of education policy studies at the American Enterprise Institute. He has authored influential books on education including *The Same Thing Over and Over, Education Unbound, Common Sense School Reform,*

Revolution at the Margins, and *Spinning Wheels*, and pens the Education Week blog "Rick Hess Straight Up." He has edited widely cited volumes on education philanthropy, stretching the education dollar, the impact of education research, education entrepreneurship and No Child Left Behind. A former high school social studies teacher, he has taught at the University of Virginia, the University of Pennsylvania, Georgetown University, Rice University and Harvard University. He holds an M.A. and Ph.D. in Government, as well as an M.Ed. in Teaching and Curriculum, from Harvard University.

E.D. Hirsch, Jr. E. D. Hirsch, Jr. is the the Core Knowledge emeritus of educatio the University of Virg

E. D. Hirsch, Jr. is the founder and chairman of the Core Knowledge Foundation and professor emeritus of education and humanities at the University of Virginia. He is the author of several acclaimed books on education issues including the best-seller *Cultural Literacy*, as

well as *The Schools We Need and Why We Don't Have Them, The Knowledge Deficit* and *The Making of Americans*. A highly regarded English professor and literary critic earlier in his career, Hirsch describes being "shocked into education reform" while doing research on written composition. Electrified by the insight gleaned from this research, he developed his groundbreaking concept of cultural literacy – the idea that reading comprehension requires not just formal decoding skills but also wide-ranging background knowledge. In 1986, he founded the Core Knowledge Foundation, and a year later, published *Cultural Literacy: What Every American Needs To Know*. A surprise publishing phenomenon, the book remained at the top of the New York Times best-seller list for more than six months.

John Hickenlooper



A geologist-turned brewpub pioneer who had never run for political office before running for Denver Mayor in 2003, Hickenlooper was elected Governor of Colorado on Nov. 2, 2010. In 2005, after serving only two years as mayor, Time Magazine placed him among the top

five "big-city" mayors in the country. In 2008, Hickenlooper brought a new level of attention to the Mile High City, successfully marketing Denver as an ideal place to host the 2008 Democratic National Convention. Overall, his tireless efforts to improve the city of Denver paid off. Despite shrinking budgets and managing the city through two national recessions, a recent citizen survey found that Denver's overall community quality rating improved to 86% in 2010 from 78% in 2002. Hickenlooper ran for Governor of Colorado on a jobs creation and economic development platform. In using his experience as a jobs creator and consensus builder in government, he wants to increase opportunity for the people of Colorado. And perhaps most importantly, he has a track record of bringing people together to solve problems instead of stoking the same old partisan squabbles.

Amelia Hodges



Amelia Hodges is the Delaware Department of Education's associate secretary for the College and Workforce Readiness Branch. A graduate of the University of Delaware, she completed her doctoral program in Educational Leadership with a concentration on Policy and

Administration. She previously worked in the Christina and Smyrna School Districts and presently serves as an adjunct instructor at the University of Delaware. Hodges began working at the Department of Education in 2000 and has since served as education specialist for Data Management; education associate for Quality Assurance; education associate for Professional Development; and director for Career, Technical and Consolidated Programs.

Thomas Horgan

Johnston started his own career as a principal, leading two alternative high schools serving Colorado students held in state custody or living in group homes and detention centers. Dennis P. Jones

Dennis P. Jones has more than 40 years of experience in research, development, technical assistance and administration in the field of higher education management and policymaking. A member of the NCHEMS staff since 1969, he assumed increasing levels of
